It's a great privilege to present the Jackpot Community Trust Impact Report for 2025.

Since our launch in 2023, it has been incredibly rewarding to witness the reach and impact of the trust expand year on year. Over the last year, our dedicated players of both The Scotto and What a Lotto have allowed us to continue making a real difference to people facing some of life's most challenging moments, supporting causes that are making a genuine difference to lives across the country.

In 2025, the Jackpot Community Trust raised over £330,000 for good causes across the country, a figure that reflects the extraordinary generosity of our players and the strength of a model built for lasting impact. That brings our total to over £600,000 raised since our lotteries began, a milestone we are immensely proud of.

These achievements mean even more in a period where demand on charities to meet the growing needs of the people they serve continues to rise. As trustees, we are very aware of this reality, and we are honoured to play our part in ensuring our charity partners can continue to meet those demands with confidence.

The last year has been filled with so many highlights. Alongside our existing charity partners, we have forged meaningful new relationships with organisations like Teenage Cancer Trust, Together for Short Lives, Cyrenians and Give a Dog a Bone.

Each of our partners covers a distinct range of causes and delivers vital support to those who rely on their services every day.

We have also been able to reach more charities than ever before through the Bright Futures Fund. This fund offers charities a grant award of £1,000, which can be directed wherever they feel it is needed most. The application process is quick and straightforward, ensuring charities can remain focused on what matters most - making a lasting impact on people's lives.

None of our success this year would have been possible without the tireless dedication and passion of our board of trustees, the remarkable efforts of all our charity partners, and of course, the players. By people playing both The Scotto and What a Lotto, they are making a tangible, real-world difference to people facing some of life's most challenging moments.

There is much to be optimistic about as we move into 2026. Each of our charity partners will remain on board for the coming year, meaning we can deepen those relationships further, tell more powerful stories and continue to make a real impact on lives across the country. Message from Head of Charity Operations

When I reflect on 2025, the overwhelming feeling is one of pride, not just in the figures, but in the relationships and the real people behind them.

This year, through The Scotto and the launch of What a Lotto, we have raised over £330,000 for good causes. That brings our total to almost £600,000 since our lotteries began in 2023 - a milestone that speaks to the generosity of our players and the strength of a model built on sustainable funding and long-term partnerships.

For me, 2025 has been about deepening and broadening impact in equal measure. Our long-standing partners, Calum's Cabin, SAMH and House of Hope, have each now received over £100,000 in funding. Reaching that level of support matters. It moves beyond

one-off grants and into meaningful, multi-year backing that allows organisations to plan, breathe and focus on delivering vital services.

At the same time, we were proud to welcome new partners: Cyrenians, Give a Dog a Bone, Together for Short Lives and Teenage Cancer Trust. Expanding to seven charity partners has widened our reach across the UK and across causes, from mental health and homelessness to youth support, community resilience and palliative care.

Some of my favourite moments this year have been the simple, human ones. Members of our team spent time volunteering at Cyrenians' Edinburgh depot, rolling up their sleeves to support FoodShare operations and seeing first-hand how redistributed food reaches those who need it most.

We were back on the dancefloor at Calum's Cabin's "Strictly" fundraiser, and I'm delighted to say that while Tommy represented us brilliantly in 2024, this year Carina from our marketing team brought the trophy home. And attending SAMH's Ultimate Sports Quiz, hosted by Sir Chris Hoy, was a powerful reminder of how communities rally together to champion mental health support.

Beyond the highlights, we cannot ignore the wider context. Demand on the third sector continues to rise, while statutory and local funding remains stretched. Having worked in the sector for over 15 years, often on the other side of the funding relationship, I understand how important it is to create a model that works for charities. Our aim is to be flexible, supportive and dependable. Multi-year funding is not just a financial commitment; it's a vote of confidence in the organisations we back.



Operationally, the introduction of a second lottery has marked a significant step forward. Growing our annual charitable contribution by 26% compared to 2024 shows what is possible when players, trustees and our internal team work together with a shared purpose.

To our players: thank you. Every ticket makes a tangible difference. To our trustees: your guidance ensures we remain responsible and transparent stewards of these funds. And to the team behind the scenes managing the lotteries day in, day out, your dedication makes this impact possible.

As we look towards 2026, we do so with ambition. Surpassing £1 million raised for good causes since 2023 is firmly in our sights. More importantly, we will continue strengthening partnerships, telling powerful stories and ensuring that sustainable funding reaches the communities who rely on it most.

For me, that is what this work is all about, making a real, lasting difference, together.



Meet the board



The outstanding work we do here at the Jackpot Community Trust is driven by our board of Trustees. Their role is to ensure correct governance, manage the funding distributed to each of our charity partners across the UK, and foster relationships with each organisation we support.

Each of our trustees is deeply passionate about charitable causes and has had personal experiences which drive their work to deliver worthwhile and impactful projects

Working alongside Steven are Scott Laird and Donna Hoggan, both highly qualified accountants with over 20 years' experience each. Scott is a commercially and operationally focused Finance Director, currently overseeing North Europe and APAC for ASSA ABLOY Entrance Systems, bringing a wealth of strategic and cross-sector insight to the board. Donna trained with PwC before moving into education as a lecturer at the Institute of Chartered Accountants, where she specialised in Financial Reporting - experience she now complements in her role as Financial Accounting Manager at Energy Assets Group. Together, they bring considerable technical depth and a shared commitment to sustaining partnerships that drive meaningful change.

Each trustee brings a unique skillset that, combined, transforms the power of your play into real-life impact for individuals facing hardship across the UK.



The Scotto are Fulfilling Calum's Dream, One Family at a Time

CALUM'S CABIN

A child's cancer diagnosis reshapes every aspect of family life overnight. Appointments, caring responsibilities, financial pressure, it all becomes the new norm.

At The Scotto, we believe no family should have to carry that weight without relief. That belief is what has driven our long-standing partnership with Calum's Cabin, our very first official charity partner, and one we have been proud to stand alongside since 2023.

Over the course of that partnership, we have raised an incredible

£120,000

for Calum's Cabin.

Funding that has directly enabled breaks for over

150 families

giving them precious time together when they needed it most. As Chairperson Caroline Spiers, Calum's mum, reflects:

“

The need for our support is, sadly, significant. This is why we are so grateful for our partnership with The Scotto. £120,000 has allowed us to provide breaks to over 150 families, giving them precious time together when they need it most.”



Calum's Cabin was built in the memory of Calum Spiers, who passed away in 2007 from an inoperable brain tumour. Calum's dream was to offer family holidays to children like him on the Isle of Bute.

Our funding has helped turn that dream into something far reaching, facilitating the opening and ongoing maintenance of three further holiday homes in Ayrshire, Anstruther and Aviemore, as well as supporting twelve home-from-home flats in Glasgow, located within easy reach of treatment centres, giving families stability during the most desperate of times for as long as they need it.

Last year alone, a £50,000 Scotto contribution allowed 201 families to enjoy a holiday, and a further 41 families to stay in the Glasgow

flats while undergoing treatment. But some of the most profound impact simply cannot be measured, a smile back on a child's face, or a parent finding a quiet moment of calm after weeks of constant anxiety and uncertainty. That is what our donation makes possible.

Caroline added:

“

We always try to help in any way we can when families reach out to us for support. As a Scotto partner, it can also increase awareness of our services to families, helping us to widen our reach.”

For some of these families, the holiday made possible by The Scotto will be the first they have ever been able to share together, something they may have thought was no longer possible. We are giving them the chance to do just that, and giving children the chance to simply be children again.

No family should ever have to face cancer alone. Every time you play The Scotto, you are helping to fulfil Calum's dream and offering families the vital respite they need and deserve.

The Scotto Tackling Homelessness

Creating Stability, Changing Lives

Every night across Scotland, thousands of people face the uncertainty of not knowing where they'll sleep.

At The Scotto, we believe that has to change.

Because behind every number is a person - someone who has faced trauma, loss, or circumstances beyond their control. And with the support of our players, we're determined to help them find not just a place to stay, but a place to rebuild.

Thanks to everyone who plays The Scotto, we're able to take real action, funding life-changing support that helps people move away from homelessness and towards stability, safety, and hope.



In 2025, we invested

£50,000

to tackle homelessness in Scotland, working with Cyrenians to deliver that support directly to those who need it most.

Together, we're reaching people at some of the most critical moments in their lives, whether that's preventing homelessness before it happens, supporting someone leaving hospital with nowhere to go, or helping an individual take their first steps into a home of their own.

This Scotto-funded support is also putting food on tables, building confidence, and creating pathways back into employment and education, helping people not just survive, but move forward.

Last year alone, Scotto players helped us support over 5,500 people facing homelessness or financial hardship.

With What a Lotto, No Young Person Faces Cancer Alone



Giving Teenagers Receiving Treatment their Freedom Back

Every few hours, a young person in the UK is forced to hear the words “you have cancer.” Your teenage years should be the most exciting of your life, the time you find your independence, become your own person, and find your way in the world. Those three words can rob a young person of all of that. At What a Lotto, we believe no young person should have to face that alone.



That's why we invested

£20,000

in Teenage Cancer Trust last year, funding with the power to support a full-time outreach nurse for six months, ensuring that every young person aged 13-24 who needs specialist support can access it, no matter where they are in the UK.

Our investment helps sustain the 28 Teenage Cancer Trust units currently operating in NHS hospitals across the country. These are not ordinary hospital wards. They are bright, contemporary spaces where young people can welcome family and friends, reclaim a sense of normality, and, crucially, have a say in how their care is delivered.

Because of the environment our funding helps maintain, young people can decide how they want to fight cancer and how services should be shaped for people their age. In the middle of the most difficult experience of their lives, that independence matters.

Donna Bednarek, Senior Relationships Manager at Teenage Cancer Trust, reflects on what What a Lotto's support makes possible:



Thanks to the support from What a Lotto, Teenage Cancer Trust can continue to ensure that no young person faces cancer alone. Funding like this ensures we are there for every young person who needs us, providing vital support.”

The difference that makes is felt every day by people like Kelly, who was diagnosed with Hodgkin's Lymphoma at just 24. Access to a Teenage Cancer Trust unit, made possible through funding like ours, gave her privacy, community, and the chance to connect with others who truly understood what she was going through:



When I was diagnosed, I thought that I was the only 24-year-old with cancer, so being treated around other young people really helped me. I was able to make connections and felt more comfortable. I am on a similar cycle to the two girls I met, so it helps to have someone going through the same sort of side effects.”



Stories like Kelly's are why we do what we do. Every time you play What a Lotto, you are helping us invest in more specialist nurses, more units, and more moments like hers, making sure that no young person anywhere in the UK has to face cancer alone.



The Scotto are Turning the Tide on Mental Health in Scotland

At The Scotto, we share the deep concern felt by many over rising levels of mental distress across the country, and we are committed to doing something about it.

We want to end the stigma surrounding mental health for good. That's why, over the course of our partnership with SAMH, we have donated

£100,000

in funding.

in 2025 alone.

The Scotto and SAMH have been partners since early 2024, and in that time we have made a real, tangible difference to the lives of thousands living with mental health conditions. Our funding has enabled the expansion of a range of accessible services for people across the country, strengthening the delivery of compassionate, life-changing support and ensuring its availability to anyone, whenever they need it most.

Marie-Claire Le Ray, Business Development Manager for SAMH, said:



The Scotto's contribution has had a transformational impact on the work of SAMH, enabling us to expand services, reach more people in crisis, and strengthen mental health support where it's needed most."

Mental health issues come in many different forms - from anxiety and depression to trauma, suicidal thoughts and self-harm - and in 2025, SAMH supported over 46,000 people facing these challenges, a 64% increase from the year prior. With more than 70 active services nationwide, in both urban and rural communities, the more accessible support is locally, the easier it becomes to ask for help. Our funding has helped SAMH recruit an additional 50 people to assist with these services, further strengthening their reach across the country.

One landmark initiative which launched in 2025 was the opening of The Nook in Glasgow, Scotland's first ever dedicated walk-in mental health service.

The idea is to provide a hub where anyone who steps through the door receives professional support as soon as they enter, completely removing all barriers and waiting lists. A further four Nook centres are scheduled to open within the next two years, in Aberdeen, Edinburgh, Inverclyde and Lanarkshire.

In addition to these commitments, Time for You is an online or telephone support service available to anyone aged 16 or over, offering one-to-one personalised help in a private and confidential environment. SAMH has also increased its presence in schools, colleges and youth settings, providing children and young people with training that empowers them to look after themselves and recognise when they require additional support.

Marie-Claire added: **"Partnerships like this turn commitment into real, measurable change. Thank you to The Scotto and the players who make this happen."**

We will continue to fight to ensure everyone can access the right help in ways that feel accessible and approachable. Playing The Scotto is helping to turn the tide on mental health in Scotland, creating lasting, positive change for thousands of people across the country.



Supporting hundreds of good causes across the country.

Our charity partnerships are just the tip of the iceberg; the scope of organisations we support across the country is enormous; from providing under-privileged children and families with school uniform to championing diversity within local communities, and so much more.

We're always trying to find ways to support organisations at all levels get a little bit extra out of the extraordinary work that they do. Which is why, The Scotto and What a Lotto, in partnership with the Scottish Children's Lottery, launched The Bright Futures Fund. Created with one goal in mind; helping charities operating on a smaller scale, make a big impact.

£200,000

has been distributed to hundreds of charities who have benefitted from the fund since its launch in 2024, which offers grants of up to £1,000 per charity to support a wide range of essential activities, including:



Sports, equipment and uniforms



Clothing and cost of living assistance



Holiday programmes and activities



Vital services that improve the health, wellbeing, and future of young people





Strathmore Community Rugby Trust runs award-winning, autism-friendly rugby sessions for primary school children across Angus four times a week, welcoming up to 96 children. Their Bright Futures Fund grant will purchase dedicated sensory equipment including tents, ear defenders and crash mats, removing the need to transport kit between towns.



RDA Glasgow Group used their grant to fund a full term of equine therapy sessions for six pupils from Langfaulds Primary School with communication and behaviour needs – building core strength, confidence and independence through horseback games, riding skills and the gentle, calming companionship of horses.



C.O.J.A.C. provides out-of-school care and holiday programmes for children with complex support needs in Castlemilk, one of Glasgow's most deprived areas. Their grant is funding bus and driver hire, giving children enriching day trips to destinations like Troon Beach, Loch Lomond and Summerlee Museum.



Home-Start Renfrewshire and Inverclyde supports families with babies and young children facing poverty, isolation and hardship. Their grant is funding a winter clothing project, providing vouchers so that families, including those with no recourse to public funds, can choose warm, well-fitting coats, shoes and essentials for their children.

These are just a few examples of the fantastic causes we have helped bring to life so far. The Bright Futures Fund is showing just how far **£1,000** can go. We're proud to partner with the Scottish Children's Lottery and continue helping charities flourish at all levels across the country.

The Scotto is Helping Scotland's Elderly Thrive



Paws, Purpose and Community

Loneliness and social isolation are among the greatest challenges facing older adults in Scotland today, whether through bereavement, retirement, or illness. At The Scotto, we believe no one should face those years alone. That's why we've directed funding to Give a Dog a Bone, empowering them to bring companionship, connection, and community to those who need it most.

In 2025, The Scotto invested

£10,000

to make it possible for older adults on low incomes to afford a rescue pet from an animal shelter. Because of that investment, a person gains a forever friend, and a dog finds a forever home.



Our funding enables Give a Dog a Bone to operate four community spaces - in Glasgow, Troon, Alloa and Dunfermline - open five days a week and free for anyone to drop in. From learning new languages to line dancing, these spaces offer something for everyone. For those who may not want a pet of their own, there is still the chance to enjoy time with some very special pups, meet neighbours, and build friendships that last. Pet food banks, accessible to people of all ages, are also part of what our support makes possible.

Last year alone, this investment touched the lives of over 25,000 older adults who came through the doors of these spaces. Louise Russell, Founder of Give a Dog a Bone, reflects on what The Scotto's support means on the ground:



The funds received were distributed amongst our four community spaces, enabling us to continue our life-changing work. We could not do this without donations like yours – thank you.

The real measure of that impact is heard in the voices of those whose lives have changed. One regular visitor put it simply:



This charity has changed my life. I have met people from my community that I would not have otherwise met. My outlook on life has changed. These people are fabulous - no one judges you or asks questions. I love the camaraderie and admire every one of them."



Stories like this are why The Scotto exists. Every time you play, you are directly funding moments like these, uniting older adults with a companion of their own, and keeping the doors of these vital community spaces open for thousands more.

How The Scotto is Supporting Scotland's Breast Cancer Community



A Place to Pause

Breast cancer affects 1 in every 7 women in Scotland. Beyond the physical impact, the mental and emotional toll can be equally consuming and is too often overlooked. At The Scotto, we believe nobody should face that journey without support. That belief is what led us to make one of our most significant investments to date: funding the creation of Scotland's first ever bespoke breast cancer and wellbeing centre.



The opening of The House of Hope in June 2025 marked a landmark moment, not just for Scotland's breast cancer community, but for The Scotto. Our continued support of the centre had by that point seen our total funding exceed

£100,000,

securing and transforming an Edinburgh property into a fully operational wellbeing and support centre for individuals and families across the country. It opened its doors because we helped build it.

The vision behind the centre belongs to founder and Chief Executive Lisa Fleming, who was inspired by her own diagnosis in 2017. Our funding turned that vision into a reality, giving Lisa and her team the foundation they needed to build something truly remarkable for Scotland.

Lisa reflects on what that support has meant:



I want to express how vital our partnership with The Scotto has been in bringing this vision to life. Without your unwavering support, we wouldn't have been able to establish Scotland's first bespoke wellbeing and support centre for those impacted by breast cancer and their families."



Thanks to The Scotto's investment, The House of Hope now offers a host of vital services, wellbeing and fitness classes, bespoke hair loss and wig consultations in its own on-site salon, specialist oncology treatments, and support groups for those who simply want a coffee and a conversation. It is a place to pause, to rest, and to be, whether someone needs clinical support or simply a new connection.

Since opening in June, 135 women have already benefited from the centre The Scotto helped build. And we are committed to ensuring that number keeps growing. As Lisa looks ahead, she shares our ambition:



Our key focus is to ensure that we maintain funding for the centre, so that no one faces the burden of financial stress while navigating a breast cancer diagnosis. We believe that every person deserves access to our services, especially during such a challenging time."

That focus aligns exactly with ours. Every Scotto player, new and existing, is part of what makes this possible. Because of you, we can keep the doors of The House of Hope open, and continue expanding our reach to support even more individuals and families across Scotland. Going through cancer treatment is one of the hardest things a person can face. Together, we can make it that little bit easier.



What a Lotto Supporting Families Through the Unthinkable



When Every Moment Counts

Palliative care hospices offer invaluable support across the country, but too many services lack the coordination and resources to operate around the clock, leaving families unsure of where to turn in their most desperate moments. At What a Lotto, we believe no family should ever face that uncertainty alone. That belief is what drives our commitment to funding the infrastructure that makes 24/7 support possible.

In 2025, we invested

£20,000

in Together for Short Lives, directing that funding specifically to their Family Support Hub, a lifeline that connects families with information, guidance, and practical support around their seriously ill child's care. As demand for services like this continues to grow, our investment is helping ensure that growth is met.



Nick Carroll, Chief Executive of Together for Short Lives, reflects on what that support has meant:



We're incredibly grateful to What a Lotto and the Jackpot Community Trust for their generous support. Their £20,000 contribution directly funded our Family Support Hub, helping ensure families caring for seriously ill children can access the vital emotional, practical and financial support they need at the most difficult times."

The scale of what our funding has made possible is significant. Last year, the Family Support Hub supported 1,217 families directly through its helpline, with a further 27,000 people receiving advice and support through the charity's website. Many of those families are facing acute financial hardship, with paid work no longer possible due to round-the-clock caring responsibilities and the ongoing cost-of-living crisis.

What a Lotto's investment helped Together for Short Lives respond to that hardship directly:

Nearly 550

free food shops or supermarket vouchers were arranged, distributing £68,000 in food support to families in need.

635

bereaved families received a £300 Butterfly Fund grant following the death of their child, easing urgent financial pressure at a time of profound grief.

451

families received one-to-one support from a specialist energy advisor, with over £31,000 in energy vouchers distributed to keep homes warm and power life-saving equipment.

What a Lotto's support forms part of a wider effort to ensure that children's palliative care services are there for every family that needs them – not just in the most acute moments, but through bereavement and beyond.

Every time you play What a Lotto, you are part of this. You are helping ensure that no seriously ill child, and no family facing the unthinkable, ever has to do so alone.

2025 has been a year of real and meaningful progress. Over £330,000 raised for good causes, seven charity partners supported across the UK, and a growing community of players whose generosity continues to drive lasting change. As we look ahead to 2026, our ambitions are clear.

Surpassing £1 million raised for good causes since our lotteries began in 2023 is firmly within our sights. It is a milestone that would not just reflect the growth of The Scotto and What a Lotto, but the collective commitment of every player, trustee and partner who has been part of this journey. Every ticket brings us closer to that goal.



We know that demand on the third sector continues to rise while funding remains stretched. That is precisely why we remain committed to a model built on long-term, flexible partnerships - ones that give charities the stability and confidence to plan ahead, focus on delivery and make the greatest possible impact. For our existing partners, that means continuing to deepen our support. For new partners, it means building relationships rooted in trust and shared purpose from day one.

Growing the reach of both The Scotto and What a Lotto will be central to everything we do in the year ahead. More players means more funding, and more funding means more lives changed. It is as simple as that.

Ultimately, our goal remains the same as it has always been - to ensure that sustainable, meaningful funding reaches the communities and individuals who need it most, when they need it most.
